

ort St. Johns Local Municipality is a Class B municipality and an administrative area of the O.R. Tambo District Municipality of Eastern Cape in South Africa.

It is named after its only large town, Port St. Johns that is situated on the Wild Coast on a coastline of about 270km long. It is bound on the southeast and south by the Indian Ocean; to the southwest and west by the Nyandeni Local Municipality, and in part the Mnenu River; and to the northwest, north and northeast by the Ingquza Hill Local Municipality (Qaukeni) and in part the Mzintlava River. The major river in the municipality is the Umzimvubu River, and the large town of Port St. Johns is at the mouth of the Umzimvubu, that flows through a gorge known as the "Gates of St John" into an estuary located on the Indian Ocean. On both sides of the river ravine are high sandstone mountain peaks: Mount Thesiger and Mount Sullivan.

The municipality consists of 20 wards and covers a total area of 1239 square kilometers (8800 hectares). There are over 130 villages in the municipality.


Ngcambu Tours in a mission to attract, keep tourists in Port St Johns

Sonwabo describes tour guiding as a sport and activity that may keep children or everybody busy. "This is not pride based, rather identity of commitment in making our country a more accommodative destination," he said.

Mpumezo is currently amongst 6 Mpondoland/Wild Coast Guides mentored by Dr Sinegugu Zukulu. "We are hosting Micealhouse Boys High in Cultural experience Edu Tour since 2021 in September which is a multi-National school. The impact of this experience on our boys and some of our staff went far deeper than I could ever have imagined. It is almost impossible to quantify, and so I think the best I can do is to try and qualify this transformational experience through an anecdotal reflection," he said. Kolobeni has a dream of seeing Port St Johns match the international standard and one of the top tourism destinations in Africa, attracting more tourists than this time.



Sizwe Dusubana is a young official registered tourist guide based in Port St Johns, whose mission is to promote tourism in deep remote areas of Port St Johns. Dusubana is a founder of Wild Coast Trails and Transfers which offers one day hike lunch, two day overnight hike and five day overnight hike from Port St St Johns to Coffee Bay or vice versa. Along their way with tourists they teach them about rivers, birds and trees.

"We cross the rivers by foot or by boat, walk up the hills and go lonely on beaches, through splendid forests. Sleeping dinner and breakfast in homestay accommodations run by locals," he said. Sizwe believes that it is crucial to promote rural tourism because the tourists are able to know about our cultures in South Africa. He expressed his gratitude to Mr Mangala and Jimmy Selani who gave him an opportunity to this industry of tour guiding. "They trained me and now I am running my own tourist guide company. In 2008-2009 Dusubane was awarded as the Best tour guide in the OR Tambo region.

cumisa Somakephu is a proud owner of Ncumisa's Homestay situated at Noqhekwana Village in Port St Johns. Homestays are accomodations in a form of rondavels, and this excites tourists because it gives that feel of rural life.

"In 2004 I was a Tour Guide, it was a bit straining and demanding for me. That's when I ventured into this accommodation business to give visitors that rural feeling. I setup and prepare a rondavel for my guests and they sleep on what is called ukhukho which is a traditional xhosa mat made from grass," explained Ncumisa.

For breakfast she serves guests porridge, steamed bread and vetkoeks. "After breakfast I give them hot water in a basin to bath, but some used to complain that it was difficult for them, so I had to make two outdoor showers with hosepipes to accommodate those who cannot use the washing basin," she said. For lunch she serves seafood, fish, crayfish, mussles and oysters.

She also highlighted that her business creates job opportunities for fellow villagers, There is an entertainment traditional dance group, fshermen, and others who sell their craftwork to tourists.

Before Philasande started the business of producing and manufacturing beauty products, she was working at a nursery in Southernwood, Mthatha. Mahlakathi, started developing an interest in plants, when she was working there in 2006 to 2007. Loving of plants led her to produce beauty products from these plants. In 2008, she came back home in Port St Johns, where she became a manager and she stayed there only for a year and the opportunity came through as the nursery in Mthatha was for sale. So, she popped out from her own pocket, purchasing that nursery. "I started there doing gardening services in Mthatha households, maintenance on a monthly basis in schools and even in the municipalities. At some point, as I'm running a nursery I learned some aspects of the business, it's when I explored other avenues of producing essential oils. It was not easy to penetrate the industry of oil production as it is white dominated sector," she said. Even though there are some challenges in this business, this dynamic young woman is optimistic to succeed in this sector. She is interested in contributing to the economy of this country and creating job opportunities and training more to participate in this sector. Philasande recently acquired the steam distillation unit from the department of land reform which will help to grow her business. Meanwhile in 2010, she won an award from the department of Agriculture as the best young female entrepreneur.

Sajonisi Chickens is a poultry business operating in Port St Johns, 967 eGephini, Mtumbane location. Its principal activities are to produce and supply live and slaughtered chickens, chicks and eggs. The business is owned and operated by the ambitious, young businessman Siyabonga who holds Masters in Public Affairs.

He founded the business in 2020 during the Covid-19 lockdown. "As I was always indoors and depressed by not getting the job that I spent years studying for, I used the lockdown as the opportunity to think of ways to tackle stress of being jobless. My hard work paid off when more lives were changed as the business began to employ not only me but more people of the community," he said.

As of May 2024, the business has five employees and plans to have doubled the number by 2025. The business's mission is to be a competitive commercial supplier of live and slaughtered chickens, chicks and eggs within the region of OR Tambo District Municipality, Eastern Cape in particular (initially-on conception of company) with a view to expand once it has fully secured its target market.

Presently, Sajonisi chickens target market is based in households, restaurants, retailers, butcheries, bakeries, government and private companies. It aims at opening opportunities to previously disadvantaged individuals-thus making a meaningful contribution to the empowerment of women, youth and people with disability. The business wants to contribute to development by creating a vibrant economy and instill the initiative of ploughing back to the community.

A rare breeding by a Port St Johns young farmer






Luzuko followed this route in farming after reading a book on sustainable farming five years ago. Then, that led him to establish Babalo Farming. After reading a book he became more interested in breeding rabbits. "In the book they stated that rabbit droppings and urine are rich in nutrients. I knew rabbit meat was healthy and that is on the market as some farmers I know buy it or have rabbits on their farms for their own consumption. So I started breeding them and a year later I started keeping bees. I never thought I would be a beekeeper because I fear bees even seeing a swamp gives me goosebumps," said passionate Luzuko.

Luzuko heard about bee keeping training in Port St Johns and he decided to attend with a guy who was conducting that training. "The guy took my number and later I was helping him in his farm to gain some knowledge on the trade and I stepped out and got my own hives as well and started keeping," said Kamtshe.

Even though Kamtshe is facing some challenges, he never dropped his dream of becoming more successful in this type of farming. His main goal is to build an Eco-village, where his idea of rabbit breeding and bee keeping was established. He also wishes to become a South African organic seed bank and see this type of farming sustain and become prominent. He is so proud of introducing something new to the community and he is willing to expand but lack of funding and having no source of income may hinder his wishes.

A family in a mission of using the land as source of income





Abambo Farm's main products are vegetables of the season, fresh produce, whole plants (as they would be supplied in a plant nursery) and home-made sauces made from Pepper dews & chili peppers. Our vegetables are started from seeds and sometimes sourced from nearby plant nurseries are mango, avocado pears, guava, macadamia nuts, pawpaw and banana

Abambo farm also produces medical plants sometimes used as ornamental plants, plants used for crafts. Their market is the local supermarkets, individuals, family and friends.

Plants for expansion: making pastes from a variety of herbs, fresh fruit juices from mango, pineapple and other fruits, restaurant & tea garden, crafts shops, cannabis coffee shop, we also make beaded garments.

The bead work on our garments is done by women from the surrounding villages. Most of our orders are made for heritage celebrations and cultural events.

We are in the process of applying for a permit to cultivate Hemp and are on the local government of Agriculture's database and will be processing our cannabis under the government medical marijuana license.





As they are not permanent lifeguards working only on December and Easter holidays, nevertheless Ndumisa is hoping that one day they will be employed on a full time basis or the contract to be increased to six months, so that they would stop drowning which entrenches Port St Johns beaches particularly Second beach.


An aspiring craft specialist in PSJ

Amanda is aiming at opening a craft shop and being able to employ youth. To provide training or workshops and to be every person's first choice. He said when he conducts training, he always encourages creativity and also calls to make use of cultural collaboration through craft.



xolisi Bhadulana from Genville is an owner of Zele Shop which manufactures baskets in the Coastal town of Port St Johns. Bhadulana has been in this industry for the past 18 years, nevertheless he still has no stable market. Even that difficulty never demoralized his passion of manufacturing the baskets to make ends meet.

After hunting for employment for some years but in vain, instead of sitting home folding his arms, he ventured in the baskets business which he learned from his elders back at home. "We were doing very well until the COVID 19 took center stage in this country and completely ruined our business. COVID immensely affected my business even now, that's why we are still appealing to the government or municipality to offer an injection to boost our businesses because it will take time to be fully recovered. This is the only source of income that I am having and there is no way I can get a job now because I failed to get it at my early age," lamented Bhadulana. Presently Bhadulana also trains the young people to ensure that his legacy leaves on and be passed on to the next generation.



S imon Mkhontwana from Gimville in Port St Johns has been in the craft for some decades and he educated his children with money from the craft. Even though there is no market, he does not see himself living the craft.

Mkhontwana crafts different types of wood workmates, keyholders, baskets and so forth. He sells them in the local B&Bs in Port St Johns and surrounding localities. He has a stand in town, where the visitors are flocking in large numbers to buy his beautiful work. "We were four when we were starting but now we are two, the others left because there is no money. Since we love this we are still continuing and we are hoping that one day the government will provide assistance in crafting," he said.

His daughter, Noloyiso Mkhontwana, who is also working with her dad in the stand, agreed that her father loves craft work wholeheartedly. "Since I was born my father was doing this and now we are old, he is doing it. We went to school with the support from his craft work," said Noloyiso.

Port St Johns songbird makes her mark in music






With her soulful voice and unwavering commitment to her roots, the isiMpondo singer serves as a positive example for young people in South Africa and beyond.

He was inspired in the Umbhaqanga music with the likes of Steve Kekana, Soul Brother, Babsie Mlangeni and many more. He went to the Gauteng province for greener pastures and fortunately got a chance of backing many groups of Umbhaqanga music. It was a great opportunity for the rural boys to crack in the music industry in cities like Gauteng. In 2009, he turned his focus to Maskandi and went solo when he became famous.

From there he released his first album 'Wabethumfazi' which was followed by three albums that did well in the market. Sonaliti, now is back at home Mampube grooming the young artists in the area of Port St Johns. He is also pursuing his music career, as he is busy preparing his next album which is expected to be out this year. He is also busy teaching the young people about the traditional music in the entire Eastern Cape. "My intention is to restore the dignity of traditional music because youth of today pay more attention to western music, whereas it is very important to adhere to our own roots. There is a lot of talent in remote areas like ours, so as the old artists we need to pay focus as well to unearth such talent," said Sonaliti. He is also in a plan to establish his own studio at home to help the emerging artists from rural areas because it is too difficult to live home for cities as competition and exploitation is too high in those areas.




he Gomolo born in Port St Johns, Nomawethu Diko, started her netball career in Silimela Junior Secondary School in 1994 and currently she is an owner of Coastal Strickers netball team with her co-founders of Strickers, Nokonwaba Silinga and Zolelwa. "I started playing football just for fun, then I took it seriously playing for a team of Sadtu, later 1996, I started my own team," she said. In 2021, Diko was elected as Chairperson of netball federation, the position which she is also holding in the OR Tambo District. "There are ups and downs in netball and many challenges, but I don't have any regrets as I always faced the challenge. But what I know I will come out with solutions and good goals. I always encourage the players to be disciplined and respect the game of netball in order for netball to respect them," she concluded. Meanwhile, diko is working tirelessly to improve the mayoral cup by developing netball players from deep remote areas of OR Tambo region.

We have guys who make it a point that our customers get tasty meat after the braai. We are always there to manage everything and we hired employees who have a long experience when it comes to meat, as 95% have vast experience in whatever they do inside the butchery because we need quality service," he said. Vulintlutha is boasting of employing 17 employees and also distributing meat even in Mthatha and local businesses.





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
